French Napoleonic Prisoners of War in England

As many of us are undoubtedly aware, there is a long history of strained relations between Britain and France. Personified by the TV series Sharpe that usually portrays the French during the Napoleonic Wars as 'irretrievably odius', conflicting national interests since at least Joan of Arc (1431) have usually kept the two nations divided.

During the Napoleonic Wars, over 100,000 French prisoners or the 'others' were held in Britain at various times- some often to languish in captivity for many years. But did their reception reflect the damning depictions conveyed in such productions as Sharpe? How, for instance were the French received in England? Did any escape? Were any romances struck up? Had opinions of the French changed by the end of the Nappoleonic Wars?

Join Dr. Barnard to hear the story of the world's first purpose built POW camp, the quote 'unexpectedly beautiful' objects created there & 'how others' have been recently remembered.

Hine also designed the imposing Adams lace warehouse on Stoney Street. We will also pass handsome Georgian town houses, St Mary's Church, High Pavement Chapel and the imposing Shire Hall which once stood witness to grusome public hangings.

The Arboretum opened to the public on the 11th May 1852. The occasion was marked with a great parade and ceremony and was attended by more that 20,000 visitors. Our walk will explore the origins and design of this remarkable green space. It will look at some of the rare tree species in the Arboretum, view the ornamental aviaries, the bandstand, the Chinese pagoda and other heritage features including the statue of the firebrand orator and Chartist, Feargus O'Connor.
